Timeline

Over the past couple of months, thousands of entries have been unwrapped, logged in, and organised in preparation for judging. Below are the key dates for the rest of this year's Awards cycle:

31 August 2022: Awards results announced on Koestler Arts website

31 October 2022: Certificates and prize money sent to entrants

By end of April 2023: Unsold visual artwork returned to entrants

In an effort to ensure as many entrants as possible receive detailed feedback on their entries, we'll be sending some feedback in October with certificates and prize money, with more to follow in the new year.

Judging

Judging of the 2022 Awards is underway! For each of our 52 artform categories, we invite specialist judges to spend a day at the Koestler Arts Centre looking at, reading, or listening to entries, assigning awards, and writing feedback to entrants. Freedom, Southbank Centre, London: 27 October - 18 December 2022

We are delighted that our annual national exhibition of art, music and writing from the Koestler Awards will again be held at London's Southbank Centre this autumn.

The exhibition, titled *Freedom*, is being curated by celebrated contemporary artist, documentarian, and activist, Ai Weiwei. To mark Koestler Arts' 60th anniversary year, Ai Weiwei intends for this landmark exhibition to be our 'most ambitious yet'!

Ai Weiwei's vision for the exhibition has been shaped by visits to prisons around the world, his own experience of detention in China, and a recent visit to HM Prison Wormwood Scrubs to meet with Koestler entrants and hear about their experiences of incarceration, as well as visits to the Koestler Arts Centre to see, read and listen to the more than 6500 entries to the 2022 Koestler Awards.

Ai Weiwei was taken aback by the scale of the Koestler Awards when visiting our Arts Centre and wants *Freedom* to reflect the huge quantity and variety of creative works we receive so the visiting public can experience this too. The exhibition will include a diverse range of works from across our artform categories, and many more works than we have ever showcased before.

The exhibition space will also be physically transformed with specially built walls to reflect the environments in which most of the exhibited works were made.

Freedom promises to be a really exciting and unique Koestler exhibition and we are looking forward to the challenge of working on a much bigger scale than usual. It will be fantastic to share even more of your creative work with the public!

"This exhibition focuses on the role that the act of thinking and creating plays in life under constraints. Notable works of art and literature in history were created when the artist was restricted, oppressed, and challenged, rather than being completely free. The language and feelings that emerged from these conditions are much more profound, convincing, and powerful.

Themed Category

In our Spring newsletter we invited Koestler Associates to make suggestions for the 2023 themed category, and we were delighted to receive almost 200 responses! The Koestler Team went through your brilliant ideas, shortlisted the most popular, and voted for our favourites.

We are very excited to announce that the themed category for the 2023 Koestler Awards is...

A DAY IN THE LIFE

Thanks so much to all of you who made suggestions, and especially to the person who came up with 'A day in the life'.

Work made in any artform - visual, written or performed - can be entered into the themed category. We are always amazed to see the huge range of work the category inspires, and the variety of ways our themes are interpreted by different entrants. We are interested in personal and creative interpretations of the theme and what it means to you.

You might want to depict a day in your life or someone else's - a real or imagined person, animal or object. It might be a typical day, or a particular day from the past or future - ordinary or extraordinary. You could think about how to represent movement and change - in light, location, emotion - over the course of a day in a single image, or how to distinguish between different scenes in one sculpture or drawing. Alternatively, you might use static forms and repetition to depict the monotony of the everyday.

Below and overleaf are past Koestler Awards entries that relate in different ways to 'A day in the life', which we hope will spark some inspiration. We can't wait to see what you come up with!

But remember! ...As always, our themed category will be just one of 52 categories - the others all being different artforms such as drawing, poem, choral music, and spoken word, to which you can enter work on any subject or theme. Full guidance notes on how to enter the 2023 Awards will be sent out in January 2023.



Timeline

6th April 2023: Deadline for 2023 entries

Feedback Days

We are really excited to be currently developing a new pilot project running Feedback Days in prisons and secure hospitals.

Research we conducted in 2019-20, which many Koestler Associates contributed to through our surveys, found that feedback on their work is the thing many Koestler entrants value the most. Research participants told us they would like to receive feedback more frequently and to be able to speak directly with the experts providing feedback on their work. We hope our Feedback Day pilot project will help meet some of these needs.

So far we have run two Feedback Days - one with an art class in a prison, and one with a group of creative writers in a secure hospital, and we are busy planning more for the future! On Feedback Days, members of the Koestler team visit an establishment with a Koestler Awards judge and a former Koestler Awards entrant who is still working creatively post-release, to run a group session in which they share their own creative work, hear or see learners' work, and provide feedback on it. Participants are invited to speak about their own and each other's work, and we offer ideas about how to develop work further.

We took our Spoken Word judge Wanda and former Koestler Award winner and Mentee Christopher into St Andrew's Healthcare Birmingham to meet with a group of writers in the hospital. One of the participants has kindly written the following piece reflecting on the day, especially to be shared in this newsletter:

I have been writing anonymously for a few years now; mainly poetry and a thoughts journal. I have struggled with my mental health and I find creative writing to be very therapeutic and it has most certainly helped me in expressing my thoughts and feelings in a healthy way. It has helped me enormously in my recovery. I have entered the Koestler Awards this year and I have to say I was really excited to hear that Koestler judges were coming to Birmingham to visit us for a Feedback Day in dear old Brum.

The Feedback Day was so useful and extremely enjoyable. Wanda, who is a Koestler Spoken Word Judge, and Christopher, a former Koestler Mentee and Award Winner, came to visit us. There were seven of us in the group and we all shared our selected written pieces that were read out amongst the whole of the group through spoken word. It was incredibly powerful as we all bared our souls to one another and the words came alive, with a resonating energy that evoked many emotions of laughter, sadness, joy, and even tears. Listening to the creative writers was such a therapeutic and soothing experience. This was the highlight for me, as the words seem to me more powerful when they are read out rather than being on a page.

The feedback was really positive, constructive, and had an honesty and depth to it. We all had our unique writing styles and genres of writing; we all attentively and respectfully listened to each other's spoken words and offered our feedback to one another. I only wish we had longer as the session time went so quickly. I think that was due to the energy of the powerfully word lit education room. Hearing Wanda has inspired to me to write a rap; the rhythm and ways the words bounced was incredible. I am motivated more than ever to carry on writing. I am also going to practice spoken word reading as I recognise it is such a skilful thing to do.

Thank you Koestler for visiting us and for inspiring and helping us on our creative writing therapy journeys. Big thanks to Wanda and Christopher for your time; you are both amazing.


Greetings Cards



More Ways to Get Involved

Associates

Since 2016 we have been inviting entrants who would like more regular communication from Koestler Arts to sign up to be Associates. Associates receive regular newsletters (like this one!) with information about events and exhibitions, interviews with judges, tips for creating new work, and creative activities and opportunities. As you've read in this newsletter, we recently sent Associates greetings cards to decorate and asked them to help us select a themed category for next year's Awards.

Associates are also directly sent Awards entry forms, guidance notes, posters, and flyers at the start of every year, when we ask that they help us spread the word about the Koestler Awards within their establishments. They might stick posters up around their wing or education department, encourage others to enter the Awards, or help someone fill in an entry form.

Arts Mentoring

Since 2007 we have run the Koestler Arts Mentoring Scheme to support individuals who have been in prison to continue developing their creative work in the community. Successful applicants are matched with experienced local arts professionals - artists, writers, musicians and craftspeople - who have been specially trained by us to be Koestler mentors.

Mentees and mentors meet 7-10 times over a 12 month period, where together they identify and work towards the mentee's goals. These might include applying to a course, building up a portfolio of work, or developing techniques.

Mentees also maintain regular contact with us at Koestler and we offer them support and creative opportunities. In 2019 we held an exhibition of work made by ex-mentees, 'Our Journey' at the House of St Barnabas in London, we invited mentees to choose the 2021 Koestler Awards themed category, and we commission mentees to produce the content for our monthly Art Aid sheets.
